1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The institution is affiliated to The Shivaji University, Kolhapur under whose norms. The institution offers various programmes for the students like B.A., B.Com., B.A.B.Ed., B.Voc., B.Sc. (Non-Grant), M.A. and M.Phil. and Ph.D. In B.A. there are totally 9 departments (Subjects). The students can graduate from The institution offers the subjects like Advanced Accountancy and Industrial Managements in B.Com. programme. Our institution carries the Herculean task of creating 'Would be' teachers through B.A.B.Ed. programme. The institution offers here five subjects like English, Hindi, Marathi, History and Geography. It is an integrated programme where subjects can get the B.A.B.Ed. degree in 4 years recently. The UGC has granted permission to a B.Voc. programme in printing and publishing. The institution has received the grant too from the UGC to run this programme. The institution runs the post graduation programmes in English and Psychology. Even it has M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes in Geography. The visionary and experimental members in the Board of Director of the institution had decided to start the self financing B.Sc. programme three years back. Now it is running with the full fledge. The B.Sc. Students can graduate in chemistry, physics, microbiology, botany and computer science fro

At this institution. All these courses are smoothly running with the permission and control of the affiliated university. The university forms the board of students where the curriculum of every subject is set. After every three years the syllabus of each programme is changed by the BOS. The university conducts the examination twice in an academic year. If students want to complete their graduation in B.A., B.Com. or B.Sc. they have to face the examination in six semesters. While deciding the curriculum the BOS sets some objectives for each paper. Which have to be achieved through the syllabus of that paper. The well planned curriculum delivery is done in the classrooms through the lectures of the professors and it is strictly observed that the students must achieve those per set objectives of a particular paper. Besides these programmes the Institution runs some short term certificate and career oriented courses also. The Rural Journalism and Mass Communication, Introduction to research methodology in Economics and Certificate course in MS-Script etc. Certificate courses have been run by the institution. Even the UGC sanctioned two career oriented courses like English communication and personality Development and Certificate Course in Accountancy and Taxation are running in the Institution. At the start of the academic year considering the affiliated university guidelines the institution prepares the Academic Calendar, in which the activities to be carried out throughout the academic year are planned. As said earlier once the BOS of University set the syllabus all departments conduct the departmental meeting at the very beginning of the academic year, where the syllabus is distributed and its effective implementation plan is prepared. Once the syllabus is distributed, the teachers make the teaching plans ready.

The Context Our current higher educational system (conventional courses in particular) doesn't provide proper orientation and training for students regarding career growth and lifework balance dynamics. It results in lack of or little efforts carried out by students during their undergraduation years for building prosper careers. They don't take their study seriously. They don't understand the contemporary relevance and use of their subjects in real world. This grim situation makes our youth unemployable. Making students aware about the use of their knowledge and skills imparted through education in future life is the need of the hour. To bridge this gap our postgraduation department in Counselling Psychology has decided to make their counselling services available through conducting career conference every year. The work for conference includes collection of information about different aspects of career development throughout life span. The discussion is then carried out which helped student to understand the complexities of career building in contemporary world. It also sensitized students to learn many hard and soft skills related to career counselling throughout life span. Another feature of this conference is the exhibition of career related posters. The posters cover different areas of careers and jobs related to them through graphs, pictures, flow charts and diagrams. It covers different concerns during career developments and strategies to handle them in effective manner. The posters related to developmental aspects of human beings, effective living, balance of rational and emotional world, mental fitness, life and work balance, life satisfaction, balanced life styles to handle stress related aspects of professional life etc. 5. F) Deshbhooshan Magazine To give scope to the creative writings of the students, the college publishes an annual magazine entitled

'Deshbhooshan'. The students from Arts, Commerce, Education Science faculty contribute their articles in various literary genres for the publication of magazine. Magazine committee organizes workshops on 'Creative writing' and also takes interviews of famous writers. The college, through its various departments, organizes several activities like reading competition, debating competition, wallpaper writing competition, elocution competition on social issues and road shows etc. 3. Evidence of Success ? Scope of expression and reading competencies among students were broadened. ? The exchange transaction of books, magazines and journals in the libraries increased. ? Various activities concerning reading increased student's creative consciousness. The college is receiving qualitative articles to be published in Mahavir Times and 'Deshbhooshan' Magazine. ? Due to the books provided by the mobile library scheme the reading habit has increased among the rural readers. ?
